Too Much of A Good Thing?

First Hand Sources

- Statutes, Judgments, Regulatory Opinions
- Text to be Verified ("We said "x" in 2007")

Treatises/Article s/Newsletters

- Grade your sources (Law Review Articles beat "People Magazine") but also more subtle distinctions.
- Forward looking can be useful (this is what we expect MiFID 2 to do") but be aware that they aren't as good as primary source material.

Blogs, Chat rooms, "Examples"

- Everybody's got an opinion but increased volume = decreased value.
- Beware relying on "what someone else did" they could be wrong appearance on the internet is no guaranty of validity.



As a User - Establish a Protocol

- <u>Distrust</u> but Verify
- Find your "Favorites"
- Understand your Counterparty
- Print and save especially e-mails
- NO IM!
- Be Security Conscious



Be Aware – You May Be A "Supplier"

- Be Careful What You Put on the Internet
 - (You'd Be Surprised What Can End Up There)
- Establish a workplace policy for Internet Content
- Put in place regular reviews
- Be security conscious (Playstation)



"Unauthorized Practice of Law"
